Horses, elephants, zebras and flamingos are some of the very few creatures that can fall asleep while standing up.

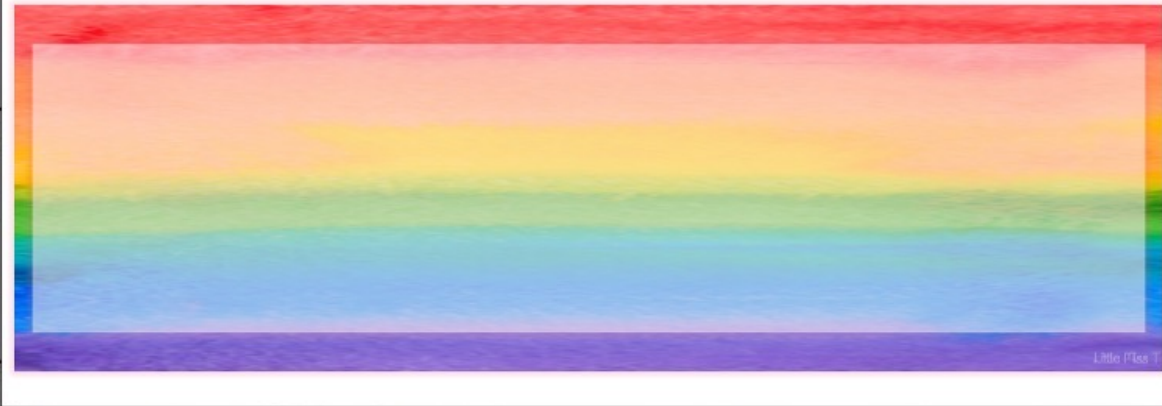
Both a kangaroo and an emu are unable to move backwards. These animals are used on the Australian coat of arms symbolising only moving forwards.
